They collect surplus medical supplies and equipment from hospitals, distributors and manufacturers, and then redistribute it to qualified healthcare facilities in the developing world. They also outfit medical missions and safety net clinics in both the U.S. and abroad.

Their shipments of medical supplies and equipment have decreased our carbon footprint and brought healing and the promise of better lives to 88 countries and countless patients.



Sixth Circuit censors criticism of religion in Freedom From Religion Foundation case

An appeals court ruled 2 Feb. 2013 that a Michigan mayor can censor nonreligious speech, while continuing to endorse a nativity scene in the city atrium.

A 3-judge panel of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit ruled against the Freedom From Religion Foundation's fight against city hall censorship at Christmastime.

"The Sixth Circuit incorrectly characterized this case as a religious-symbol-on-government-property case, when in reality this case is about free speech," noted FFRF Senior Staff Attorney Rebecca Markert.

Mayor James Fouts of Warren, Mich., routinely placed a nativity scene in the Warren Civic Center, a primary municipal building also containing the public library. FFRF and one of its members, Douglas Marshall of Warren, wrote letters protesting the display. On Dec. 8, 2010, Fouts wrote FFRF that "all religions are welcome to celebrate their religious seasons with a display in city hall." Marshall tried in vain repeatedly to obtain permission to place an FFRF winter solstice sign in the city hall atrium.

FFRF's winter solstice sign, specifically coined to counter religious displays on government property, reads:

"At this season of the Winter Solstice, let reason prevail. There are no gods, no devils, no angels, no heaven or hell. There is only our natural world. Religion is but myth and superstition that hardens hearts and enslaves minds."

In December 2012, Fouts called FFRF's sign "highly offensive," and compared FFRF's request to place its sign saying "there are no gods," to putting up a "sandwich board saying that there is no Santa Claus." Fouts stated: "I cannot and will not sanction the desecration of religion in the Warren City hall atrium."

"We are not a Christian nation. Under our secular constitution, city governments should be forbidden to endorse one religion over another, or religion over nonreligion, much less sitting in judgment of what is or isn't a 'desecration' of religion," said FFRF Co-President Annie Laurie Gaylor.

FFRF filed the lawsuit after the mayor invited other individuals and organizations to place items in the atrium of city hall, and after the mayor denied FFRF's request based solely on its Winter Solstice message — a fact completely ig-

nored by the 3-judge panel of the Sixth Circuit.

The panel found the holiday display to be government speech, but fails to reconcile this decision with its recently-decided Satawa ruling in May 2012, which allowed a private individual to erect a large nativity scene on the median of a highway in Michigan, calling it a pub-

lic forum. Douglas Marshall placed a banner last December on the median, although it was tampered with, then stolen.

Judge Sutton, who wrote the opinion, is considered one of the most conservative judges on the Sixth Circuit.

All three judges were appointed either by Bush I or Bush II. A New York Times analysis of appeals court appointees last fall showed that 63% of the appointments on it were made by Republican presidents.

FFRF asked the court to enjoin the mayor from barring the FFRF sign, and find that the city had violated the rights of FFRF and its member.

Sutton wrote that "a government may provide benefits to faith-based entities if the benefits are available to secular and religious entities alike," clearly contradicted by Fouts' action, or "may invoke the divine through words and symbols if they have religious and historical meanings or faith-based and solemnizing effects, and in the process offer at most incidental benefits to any one faith or to faith in general."

The decision makes no note of Fouts' declaration of the atrium as a public forum for religion, but decides the case based on the Lynch v. Donnelly decision (reindeer by a nativity display supposedly removes the religious message). Sutton also quotes Justice William O. Douglas declaring, "We are a religious people whose institutions presuppose a Supreme Being" in a 1952 case. But Sutton failed to add that in the very next sentence, Douglas added: "We guarantee the freedom to worship as one chooses. We make room for as wide a variety of beliefs and creeds as the spiritual needs of man deem necessary." Zorach v. Clauson, 343 U.S. at 313-314.

Justice Douglas explained his statement in McGowan v. Maryland, 366 U.S. 420, 563 (1961):

"[l]f a religious leaven is to be worked into the affairs of our people, it is to be done by individuals and groups, not by the Government. This necessarily means, first, that the dogma, creed, scruples, or practices of no religious group or sect are to be preferred over those of any others...

The First Amendment commands government to have no interest in theology or ritual; it admonishes government to be interested in allowing religious freedom to flourish — whether the result is to produce Catholics, Jews, or Protestants, or to turn the people toward the path of Buddha, or to end in a predominantly Moslem nation, or to produce in the long run atheists or agnostics. On matters of this kind government must be neutral."

In 2004, FFRF won a solid victory in the Sixth Circuit in Doe v. Porter, a case successfully challenging devotional religious insruction in Dayton, Tennessee elementary schools, conducted by bible students.

"We extend our our warmest gratitude to plaintiff Douglas Marshall, and to our pro bono counsel Danielle Hessell," said FFRF Co-President Dan Barker. FFRF intends to seek review by the entire Sixth Circuit panel.

Camp Quest News

Camp Quest families, friends, & staff,

First an update: We have 8 camper applications in now. Four are from Georgia (2 new). Five of the eight are new. I have been corresponding with several parents of potential new campers.

In an email on January 27, I expressed concern that we will have to turn away campers this

summer for the first time because of reaching the dormitory capacity allowed us at Tremont. Because of our camper numbers and growth in Georgia and Alabama, I requested support from many of you to find a facility in Georgia or Alabama at which we could start a second session of CQSM.

Lacking response, I continued to search on the internet and have identified a possibility. This is a 4 H camp in Columbiana, Alabama (see attached brochure). It seems to be well-located, southeast of Birmingham, and somewhat central to Tuscaloosa, Gadsden, Montgomery, Huntsville, and Atlanta. It is not out of range of Columbus GA, Columbus MS, Meridian, and even Chattanooga, Nashville, Memphis, Mobile, Pensacola, & Tallahassee. They have cottages, two dormitories which have about

50 beds each, food service, canoeing on a lake, swimming pool, a climbing wall, a low ropes course, archery, and more.

Youth Retreats

They have their own 4 H camp through the end of lune, but starting in July they rent out facilities, often to church groups. They are booked for this summer, but summer 2014 would be open if we were willing to commit early. I plan to drive down, perhaps next month, and perhaps with Rita and any others who would go with me or meet us there, for a preliminary survey. If the facilities are satisfactory and available when we need them (early July), we could make a commitment then for 2014. The cost would be comparable to

Tremont.

If our bid for facilities in 2014 were successful, then how might we proceed with planning and staffing? We have a number of campers from GA & AL who are coming of CIT age. With adult supervision, I see them as the key to establishing the CQ atmosphere. But many campers return to CQSM to be with their friends, and I would not want to take that away from them, nor impose additional expense on their families for a second camp. So we would need to raise funds through donations to subsidize them the first year.

Before the start in 2014, we might rent a cot-

tage over a weekend, gather potential CITs and staff, and walk through the summer program on site so potential problems could be identified in advance, and to meet the 4 H staff.

> In the longer term, we would get a local charter, initially under CQSM, and identify local people to handle future operations. Eventually this

camp would apply to CQ, Inc for recognition as an independent camp.

Commitment to this would be a gamble. Initially we would have to risk a deposit, and credibility with the 4 H camp if we fail. And we would have to raise funds so that the new camp could stand on its own financially. But I have found by experience that above all, it is necessary to find the right local Team Building

people.

But what about CQSM

2013? The girls' dorm will hold a few more than we had in 2012. We could accept a few more willing to sleep in the tents behind the activity center. And we will need to prepare for the future CITs. Can we do it? Alabama or bust?




