

THREE FFRF CHALLENGES PROCEED IN DISTRICT COURT

Freedom From Religion Foundation wins standing to sue IRS over Form 990

The Freedom From Religion Foundation, which has three historic lawsuits in federal district court over preferential treatment of churches and ministers by the Internal Revenue Service, says it now has "three bases loaded."

For the second time within three days, a federal judge has ruled in favor of allowing FFRF to pursue IRS inequities favoring churches over FFRF.

On Aug. 19, U.S. District Judge Lynn Adelman ruled that FFRF's case against church electioneering may proceed. (http://ffrf.org/images/A1716508.PDF)

U.S. District Barbara Crabb, in the Western District of Wisconsin, ruled Aug. 22 that the national state/church watchdog, based in Madison, Wis., has standing to pursue its lawsuit against the IRS for exempting churches from annual accountability requirements. (http://ffrf.org/images/A1718475.PDF)

FFRF was previously given standing and is awaiting a decision over its challenge of the 1954 federal "parish exemption" law — uniquely gifting "ministers of the gospel" with the right to deduct church "housing allowances" from tax-

able income. This case is also before Judge Crabb.

In her Form 990 ruling, Crabb wrote that the plaintiffs — FFRF and Triangle FFRF, its chapter in Raleigh, N.C. — have been injured because "the government is relieving an ongoing burden from some taxpayers on the basis of religious affiliation."

She added, "it is not plaintiffs' 'belief' that gives them standing. Rather, it is their status as organizations that are burdened with

requirements not imposed on churches."

In exchange for the significant advantage of retaining tax exemption, all 501(c)(3) organizations except churches must file an annual, onerous Form 990 with the IRS. These forms are available to the public, and reputable charities now place 990 forms on their websites for easy access.

Tax-exempts report to the public on what they do with donations, financial oversight policies, salaries of top employees, how much of the income is used for fundraising versus mission or management, etc. Most active nonprofits, such as FFRF, hire a certified public accountant to prepare the form, incurring significant accounting.

"Don't get us wrong. We think the cost and transparency is worth it," says FFRF co-founder Annie Laurie Gaylor. "We're grateful for the privilege of

the government designating donations to FFRF as deductible for income-tax purposes. But since we began filing these forms in 1978, we've been acutely aware that churches don't play by the same rules, yet get equal or better privileges."

Dan Barker, FFRF co-president, asks, "What do churches have to hide? Why don't they want to be accountable to the public?"

"Look at Jonestown, Guyana, to see can happen when tax-exempt churches are not accountable to the government, or necessarily to anyone," Gaylor added. "Had Rev. Jim Jones had to account to the government for the wealth, armory and even the foster children he and his church amassed, I believe that heinous slaughter in 1978 would have been averted."

FFRF's parish exemption challenge has received national exposure in the last week due to a bizarre legal twist. Read one of the many news stories HERE: (http://www.tennessean.com/article/20130820/NEWS06/308200069/Fedsgrant-religion-tax-breakatheists?nclick_check=1)

The federal government, seeking to get FFRF's challenge dismissed, claims FFRF's copresidents should qualify for a clergy tax break for leading an atheist organization. They are saying, "No thanks."

"We are having to tell the government the obvious we're not ministers and FFRF

isn't a church!" Gaylor said.

FFRF's Form 990 lawsuit also challenges the expensive filing fees which all groups seeking 501(c) (3) tax exemption must file — except churches. Crabb ruled that FFRF and its chapter have already paid the fees, and likely won't incur more. Crabb asked FFRF to "show just cause why that claim should not be dismissed."

The Freedom From Religion Foundation, based in Madison, Wis., a 501(c)(3) nonprofit educational charity, is the nation's largest association of freethinkers (atheists, agnostics), and has been working since 1978 to keep religion and government separate.

Holding the line in Texas textbooks

"Science scholars in Texas are giving thumbs up to coverage of evolution in proposed new high school biology textbooks," according to a press release from the Texas Freedom Network Education Fund dated August 13, 2013.

As NCSE previously reported, when the Texas state board of education last revised the state science standards in 2009, the result was a flawed set of standards. Although creationists were unsuccessful in inserting the controversial "strengths and weaknesses" language from the old set of standards, they eventually prevailed with a requirement that students examine "all sides of scientific evidence." Additionally, the board voted to add or amend various standards in a way that encourages the presentation of creationist claims about the complexity of the cell, the completeness of the fossil record, and the origin of life.

The state board of education is presently in the process of evaluating science textbooks and other instructional materials, with a final vote expected in November 2013. The worry, for those concerned with the scientific integrity of Texas's textbooks, is that publishers would be pressured to compromise their treatment of evolution in order to comply with the flawed standards. The worry was compounded, as the TFN Education Fund's press release explains, by the fact that "[s]ome of the country's most prominent evolution deniers got influential positions on official state review panels examining the next textbooks and online materials."

The TFN Education Fund commissioned a detailed review of the treatment of evolution in the textbooks and instructional materials submitted by publishers. The reviewers discovered (PDF, p. 3) that "creationists on the State Board of Education have failed to pressure publishers into including 'junk science' that questions evolutionary theory in the new high school biology materials. Indeed, all of the publishers have submitted biology instructional materials that honestly address and support the science of evolution and that do not include pseudoscience intended to water down or 'disprove' evolution."

Kathy Miller, the president of the TFN Education Fund, commented, "It appears that publishers have done a good job resisting political pressure to weaken instruction on evolution with junk science in their new textbooks ... That should be reassur-



ing for parents who want their kids to get a science education that prepares them for college and a 21st[-]century economy." "But," she added, "we're already seeing signs that the pressure on publishers will increase in the coming months." The board is expected to hold at least one and perhaps two public hearings on the proposed instructional materials.

The board is expected to receive the official reports on the proposed instructional materials before its September 18-20, 2013, meeting, during which the first public hearing will be held; Appendix B to the TFN Education Fund's report explains the process.

The Depths Of Delusion: FRC Insists DOMA Ruling Is No Big Deal

As the great philosopher Yogi Berra once said, "It ain't over 'til it's over." (http://www.yogiberra.com/yogi-isms.html) And as far as Family Research Council (FRC) President Tony Perkins is concerned, the fight to stop the legalization of same-sex marriage is far from over.

In a recent fundraising email on behalf of FRC's lobbying arm, Perkins ranted that the Supreme Court's June ruling striking down the Defense of Marriage Act (DOMA) didn't really do much.

"The media would have you believe, and the radical homosexual activists would have you believe, and the liberals in Washington would have you believe that the case is closed because the Supreme Court ruling on DOMA (Defense of Marriage Act) was the last word," he said.

"But they're wrong," he continued.
"The high court's DOMA ruling, wrongheaded as it was, only struck down
Section 3 of the law: this means people in same-sex 'marriages' who live in states that allow it, can receive federal marriage benefits—technically, once you get beyond the bluster of Justice Kennedy, the ruling accomplishes nothing more."



Hate to break it to you, Tony, but you

and the FRC are going down on this one, big time. It's true that some states still oppose marriage-equality either through legislation or in their constitutions, but the Supreme Court said DOMA violated the Equal Protection Clause of the Fifth Amendment. That's a huge step toward marriage equality (https://au.org/media/press-releases/supreme-court-marriage-decisions-advance-equality-while-preserving-religious), and it is already leading to swift changes.

Just yesterday, the IRS announced it would extend federal tax benefits to same-sex couples (including joint filing) (http://www.usatoday.com/story/news/nation/2013/08/29/irs-gay-marriage-taxes/2728927/). Some local officials in New Mexico and Pennsylvania are issuing marriage licenses (http://abcnews.go.com/US/wireStory/county-nm-issues-sex-marriage-licenses-20031933) to same-sex couples. This is surely just the beginning, since support for marriage equality is at an all-time high. (http://www.usatoday.com/story/news/politics/2013/07/01/poll-supreme-court-gay-marriage-affirmative-action-voting-rights/2479541/)

But let's entertain Perkins, for a moment. Tell us, Tony, just what will happen if same-sex marriage is legal in every state?

"On an economic level: disaster," Perkins warned. "The Government Accounting Office has determined there are some 1,138 mentions of marriage in federal law. This means nationwide legalization of same-sex 'marriage' will make an enormous negative impact on the government's budget and thus the country financially."

Huh? So allowing more people to get married somehow trashes the economy? That's funny, coming from a group that claims to be "pro-marriage." (Also, Tony, I think you meant to say "Government Accountability Office," since there is no "Accounting" office.)

Perkins also warned of a loss of "religious liberty."

"Forcing the redefinition of marriage on all states will mean a loss of religious

liberty," he wrote. "It already means parents are no longer in control of what their children are taught about sexual morality in public schools. It already means bakers and florists and photographers are being forced to participate in same-sex 'weddings' or face fines and lawsuits. Christian business owners are suffering the consequences as provisions of this law are imposed upon them."

What Perkins doesn't seem to get is that "religious liberty" doesn't give anyone a right to discriminate. Anyone can believe whatever they want about marriage, but those beliefs should not guarantee someone the right to treat someone else like a lesser human being.

Perkins even tried to justify his position against marriage equality as the mere expression of his religious beliefs rather than homophobia.

"There is nothing hateful about standing for marriage and doing our best in public policy to ensure that a child has a mother and a father," he said. "But once this position becomes 'hate,' and hate becomes a crime, Christians will be in more trouble than ever."

"This is no longer simply about marriage," he added. "This is about the federal government maneuvering a step closer to being able to silence Bible-believing churches and their values..."

That tiresome argument just won't work. No churches are being forced to perform same-sex weddings because the Constitution already guarantees that they don't have to do so. Nor is anybody in government out to silence churches or trash the Bible.

And you can pretend all you want that you care about how children are raised, but we know this is really about forcing your own idea about marriage onto other people.

Sorry, Tony, but you're on the losing end of this battle. Take a look at some polls. Note the large numbers of young people (http://www.npr. org/2013/03/24/175201923/millennials-and-same-sex-marriage-a-waning-divide) who say they support same-sex marriage. The future does not bode well for you.

Tony, you and supporters of the FRC can continue to wail all you like, but it might be better to simply face facts: Your cause is a lost one.


