


The November AFS Meetings

Our speaker on Nov. 8 is **Bob Truett** whose topic is "What is this Thing Called Love?" He has a background in zoology and a lifelong passion for studying the wild creatures that inhabit our world. He has a BS in Zoology from the University of Arkansas and was an undergraduate instructor, teaching Com-

parative Vertebrate Morphology and Embryology.

Upon graduation, Bob became an army officer and a U.S. Army Ranger, and in his second year of active duty married Lisa Vila Wys of Ponce, Puerto Rico (they've been together 59 years, so he's qualified to speak on his subject!).

Bob has worked in four public zoos: Alum Rock Park Zoo in San Jose, CA; the Cincinnati Zoo; the Lincoln Park Zoo of Chicago under **Marlin Perkins**; and for 30 years was the Director of the Birmingham Zoo. He had a weekly television show on the Alabama state-wide educational TV network for 20 years.

He bought 110 acres of forest land before retiring and made a nudist park, calling it Gymno-Vita Park. It's been in operation for 36 years and is the only park in Alabama for two-gender couples and families with children.

Together they offer a challenge to traditional faiths and an invitation to the "nones" (those who refuse to identify with any particular faith tradition), the fastest growing demographic in the USA, especially among Millennials.

Both are members of the Clergy Project (Gretta is a board officer), a support community for current and former religious professionals without supernatural beliefs. Ryan recently started his "Life After God" project to help people wrestling and questioning in the liminal space between theism and atheism, and Gretta is a senior advisor/consultant for his project.

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Pentagon Problems: Family Research Council VP Once Paid Christian Missionaries To Spy For America


The Pentagon paid evangelical missionaries to spy on North Korea, The Intercept's Matthew Cole reported on Monday.

Ken Hiramine, formerly the president of Humanitarian International Services Group (HISG), acted as a Pentagon spy from 2004 to 2006. But before Hiramine was a spy, he was an aid worker. He was not, however, a secular aid worker. Instead, he was a missionary who used shipments of donated clothing to disguise smuggled Bibles. He had to be cautious because North Korea, whose regime enforces an idiosyncratic version of communism, forbids proselytization.

If Hiramine managed to penetrate the insular state, reasoned Pentagon officials, perhaps he could smuggle surveillance equipment, too. And since it has been extremely difficult to gather any intelligence on the notoriously secretive North Korean government, defense officials were apparently open to unusual solutions.

"Hiramine, in his role as CEO of HISG, tapped Christian missionaries, aid workers, and Chinese smugglers to move equipment into and around North Korea — none of whom had any idea that they were part of a secret Pentagon operation," Cole wrote.

Sam Worthington, who heads an international network of non-governmen-



Thus the Pentagon may have directly funded Christian proselytization.

But that didn't trouble the Pentagon official who created the program. During his tenure as deputy undersecretary of defense for intelligence, U.S. Army Lt. Gen. William G. "Jerry" Boykin created and managed the program until he retired in 2007. He now works for the Family Research Council (FRC) as its executive vice president.

Cole called the program Boykin's "brainchild." He used his position not only to pay Hiramine and his missionaries to spy, but to create work for his

fundamentalist friends.

The Pentagon needed to hide the source of HISG's funding, so it funneled the money through a private fund expressly created for the purpose. That fund—the New Millennium Trust—donated the money in turn to the Working Partners Foundation. Boykin appointed a "dear friend" to head the latter foundation. A Pentagon source called the project a "jobs program" for Boykin's friends and former colleagues.

Boykin, of course, is a notable extremist. In 2004—the same year he tapped Hiramine to spy—the U.S. Department of Defense reprimanded him for sectarian speeches he made while in uniform.

He's not so fond of President Obama. In 2013,

Freedom From Religion Foundation objects to Mississippi park filled with Christian displays

The Freedom From Religion Foundation has sent a letter of complaint to the city of Collins, Miss., asking that the city remove its large collection of Christian displays from Bettie D. Robertson Memorial Park.

A local resident reported that the park includes three large crosses, a statue of Jesus carrying a cross, a globe reading "City of Collins" above a picture of Jesus and a bible verse, a miniature church, and Christmas light figures, including Jesus walking on water. Some of the figures are featured in an annual "Christmas in the Park" light display, but remain up year round.

"All of the above religious displays are unconstitutional," wrote FFRF Staff Attorney Elizabeth Cavell in a letter to the city on





Oct. 19. "The Establishment Clause prohibits government sponsorship of religious messages," she said, and in particular, "the religious significance of the Latin cross is unambiguous and indisputable."

"In its current state, Bettie C. Robertson Memorial Park is tremendously unwelcoming to non-Christian citizens," Cavell wrote. "Citizens of all faiths and no faith have an equal right to use city parks without being surrounded by symbols promoting any one religion. A city cannot have a 'Christian' park."

FFRF's letter concludes asking the city to immediately remove all religious displays from the park "to eliminate the appearance of government endorsement of religion."

he lamented the fact that the military cannot forcibly remove Obama from office.

"People I've spoken to would like to see the military 'fulfill their constitutional duty and take out the president," he told WorldNetDaily. "Our Constitution puts a civilian in charge of the military and as a result a coup would not be constitutional. You're not going to see a coup in the military."

Boykin also accused Obama of plotting a "Marxist insurgency" backed by a secret military force in 2010. He has argued repeatedly that Islam doesn't merit First Amendment protection and advocated a ban on the construction of mosques. And, like most Religious Right figureheads, he's a firm believer in the myth of Christian "persecution."

At one point not long ago he became enraged by reports that the Military Religious Freedom Foundation's Mikey Weinstein met with Pentagon officials to discuss proselytization within the ranks, and Boykin claimed that Christians would face imminent persecution as a result. "If this policy goes forward, Christians within the military who speak of their faith could be prosecuted as enemies of the state. This has the potential to destroy military recruiting across the services as Americans realize that their faith will be suppressed by joining the military. Our brave troops deserve better. If chaplains and other personnel are censored from offering the full solace of the Gospel, there is no religious freedom in the military," he blustered.

There was, of course, no "policy" to criticize. It has long been illegal for members of the military to proselytize their brothers and sisters in arms.

But in a twist worthy of Alanis Morissette, it's Boykin himself who put Christians in danger. He has in effect painted a target on every Christian missionary and aid worker deployed to a hostile country. Moreover, he arguably violated the religious freedom rights of HISG employees. Most had no idea they were participating in a Pentagon-funded program. They simply believed they were performing ordinary aid work—albeit with an evangelical ethos. It's reasonable to speculate that many likely would have objected to the prospect of working for the Pentagon.

Boykin no longer works at the Pentagon and can no longer put anyone else in direct danger. But his decision to put missionaries in harm's way without their consent should end his career as a voice on supposed "religious freedom," too.

Nonbelief Relief gives grant to Doctors Without Borders, seeks donations from nonbelievers

Nonbelief Relief (<u>http://ffrf.org/get-involved/nonbelief-relief-inc</u>), a new humanitarian agency for "atheists, agnostics, freethinkers and their supporters to improve this world, our only world," is announcing its first grant: \$20,000 to Doctors Without Borders (Médecins Sans Frontières). Nonbelief Relief



is a venue for nonbelievers to give assistance as nonbelievers.

"We think it's important that it be known that secularists are just as charitable, if not more charitable than the religious, but have simply lacked the infrastructure to give as a united group under the

banner of freethought," says Nonbelief Relief President Annie Laurie Gaylor, who also serves as co-president of the Freedom From Religion Foundation.

The Nonbelief Relief board voted to give the grant following the Oct. 3 aerial bombing by the U.S. military of a Doctors Without Borders hospital in Kunduz, Afghanistan, killing 22 people: 12 staff members and 10 patients, including three children. Another 37 people, including 19 staff members, were injured.

The AC-130 aircraft "raked the medical compound with bursts of cannon fire, potentially even using high explosive incendiary munitions, for more than an hour," according to The Washington Post.

"The attack constitutes a grave violation of International Humanitarian Law," Doctors Without Borders noted, calling it an "attack on the Geneva Conventions" and a "war crime." It's seeking an unprecedented independent investigation by the International Humanitarian Fact-Finding Commission.

The hospital is the only facility of its kind in northeastern Afghanistan and has provided free high level "life- and limb-saving trauma care" for four years. Last year, more than 22,000 patients received care there and more than 5,900 surgeries were performed.

The main hospital building housing the intensive care unit, emergency rooms and physiotherapy ward was repeatedly and "very precisely" hit during bombing raids at approximate 15-minute intervals between 2:08 and 3:15 a.m. "Patients who were unable to escape burned to death as they lay in their beds," said a Doctors Without Borders press release.

"President Obama expressed regret over the tragic incident and offered his thoughts and prayers on behalf of the American people to the victims, their families and loved ones," a White House statement said.

"Regret, thoughts and in particular prayers do not accomplish a thing," said Dan Barker, Nonbelief Relief vice president and FFRF co-president.

"We know that 'Nothing fails like prayer,' in the words of FFRF's principal

founder, Anne Nicol Gaylor. Freethinkers believe in 'Good works, not long prayers,' as Anne Royall, our country's first secular lobbyist, put it," Barker added.

Others on Nonbelief Relief's board are: Lisa Strand, FFRF's director of operations; Stephen Hirtle, FFRF's chair and professor at the University of Pittsburgh; and Madison, Wis.-area businessman Jim Zerwick, who proposed the donation to Doctors Without Borders.

FFRF is the sole member of the charity. Individuals and FFRF members may add their donations to Doctors Without Borders by designating an online donation for Nonbelief Relief.



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
