nized emergency relief for tornado-torn parts of Alabama, and done a lifetime of good works in just a few years. Tidwell's talk, "Atheist Mind, Humanist Heart: from Alabama to Ghana and Back," will certainly continue and enhance his reputation as a speaker who enlightens and inspires.

Warren Alan Tidwell is a writer from Alabama who recently spent a year working to liberate women from refugee camps in Ghana where they live in exile from their home communities. He has

spent a number of years working in grassroots disaster relief and once inadvertently started a worldwide act of kindness movement after the tragic shootings at Sandy Hook elementary in 2012. He now writes for Patheos.com.

His talk will include stories of growing up as a closeted nonbeliever

in Alabama and how that inspired him to open up about his atheism to live his values and no longer compromise who he is to do humanitarian work.


fortunate to have such a renowned and effective speaker for our program. Those who have heard Tidwell speak and know what he has done are expecting an excellent program.

Nelson Price ("God Answers Our Prayers, Even if the Answer is 'No,'" MDI, 12 November) has shown in many earlier columns a complete disregard for logic, but he does it spectacularly foolishly again this time. Price dismisses skeptics who comment on the Sutherland Springs, Texas, church shootings and ask how such horrors can be squared with an all-powerful, all-merciful God. But he offers no basis for rejecting skeptics like me except to say that we just don't understand God or prayer. (He doesn't even get the name of the church right, though that's not Price's main problem.)

Price offers no defense at all of an all-powerful God who apparently just looked away in Sutherland Springs while children and worshippers were slaughtered, but he does pretend to defend/ explain prayer, even declaring that his claim is "confirmed." All of the examples he provided, however, would be exactly the same if there is no god at all.

If Nelson Price and other Christians want to have faith and religious beliefs with no rational foundation, that is their right. But Price's fulminations make his religion look silly, not profound.

LOCAL COLUMNIST I NELSON PRICE God answers our prayers, even if the answer is 'no'

In light of the Sunderland Baptist Church shootings, prayer has very much been in the news lately. Skeptics are boasting prayer doesn't work or there would have been no shootings. Public figures have been criticized for offering their prayers and condolences to the bereaved.

As an aside, Jesus said, "In this world, you will have tribulation."

Much misunderstanding exists regarding prayer among persons who do not practice it, and even some who do. Prayer is not a lucky rabbit's foot to be rubbed when in need of good luck. It is not a parachute to be used to bail out of a problem. Neither is it a spare tire to be used in case of an emergency.

The question of whether God answers prayer deserves consideration. The answer is a confirmed "yes." That is one of several answers.

Sometimes the answer is "no." After all, no is an answer. In retrospect, many of us should be thankful He didn't say "yes" to some of our now obvious foolish prayers.

Sometimes, the answer is "wait a while." This gives God time to be God and condition the person and arrange circumstances before saying "yes."

Sometimes, having a sense of humor, He must say, "You have got to be kidding."

On a more somber note, He must at times query, "Which one of us is God?"

At other times, He must feel, "I thought you would never ask."

Then there are those decisive times He says "yes" and there is a direct obvious positive response. Most persons of faith have had those occasions when the response of "yes" had to be because of supernatural action.

Most have prayers answered without realizing they were. Every prayer has two aspects. One is the specific "request," the thing asked for. The other element is the "reason" for which it was asked. God responds in four ways regarding these. I. Yes to the request and no to the reason. 2. No to the request and yes to the reason. 3. Yes to the request and yes to the reason. 4. No to the request and no

An example of No. 2 is a prayer I offered each morning for years. First, God said wait a while.

I offered that prayer as I passed a beautiful lake sight on Stilesboro Road. I prayed God would let me have control of that land on which a consortium could build a Christian school.

My request was for the land. The reason was that there might be a Christian school built on it.

He said "no" to my repeated request. Another group got it. He said "yes" to my reason. A Christian school, Mount Paran Christian School, is there now. I thank God for the "no" and rejoice over the "yes." The developers have done a magnificent job.

God is under no obligation to prove Himself to any person. At a point, Job questioned Him and, in effect, He said, "I don't owe you an answer." I am not going to tempt God by demanding He prove Himself in a given way at a specific time.

Biblically, the Bible instructs the person of faith to ask, seek and knock. I consider that to be my responsibility. Answering is God's responsibility.

Knowing more than we and loving stronger than we, His answer is always based on those two facts.

It's Beginning To Look A Lot Like There Won't Be Much Of A 'War On Christmas' This Year

It's the first day of December, which normally means it would be time to gin things up on the "War on Christmas," but, to be perfectly honest, I'm having some trouble mustering much enthusiasm this year.

I'm not the only one. The Religious Right seems to be losing interest as well.

Let's face it, things just haven't been the same since Bill O'Reilly got booted off the Fox News Channel. Old Blowhard Bill was the yuletide's biggest defender. I swear he employed a seasonal staff of holiday elves who did nothing but comb the internet looking for stories about conflict over the

placement of nativity scenes and so on. With Bill out of the picture, Fox rarely calls anymore.

In an attempt to survey the seasonal landscape, I've been looking around a bit myself. So far, there are just a few stories out there:

 In Washington, D.C., the government agency that runs the Metro, D.C.'s subway system, is being sued by the Archdiocese of Washington because it rejected a Christmas-



themed ad. The Washington Metropolitan Area Transit Authority says its policies bar ads that contain sectarian or political content.

- In San Jose, Calif., a local chapter of the Satanic Temple erected a Christmas tree in a public park, taking part in a program known as "Christmas in
 the Park," that allows religious and community groups to display decorated
 trees. The Satanic Temple's tree was topped with a head of Baphomet, a
 goat-headed deity and someone stole the head. Police are investigating.
- In Somersworth, N.H., an atheist flag is flying in Citizens Place, a spot
 where officials allow residents to display their own messages, usually in
 the form of flags. Richard Gagnon, a town resident and member of the
 Freedom From Religion Foundation, said he made the request to mark
 Winter Solstice.
- In Blue Ridge, Ga., town officials invited residents to put up private holiday displays in a public park. One man affiliated with American Atheists erected a sign promoting non-belief. It was removed.

These skirmishes are interesting, but they're weak eggnog compared to some of the battles we've fought in years past. In fact, the best evidence for the War on Christmas that I've seen so far comes, ironically, from the White House, where First Lady Melania Trump has decorated the East Colonnade to look more like the lair of Krampus than a Winter Wonderland.

Last year, President **Donald Trump** vowed that you would hear "Merry Christmas" in stores more often (instead of the dreaded "Happy Holidays" or – gasp! – "Season's Greetings"). Of course, Trump has no authority to

dictate what holiday greetings are used in private businesses. His bluster may have pleased the Religious Right, but at the end of the day, Trump's promise was thinner than dollar store wrapping paper.

Although it's only Dec. I, it looks like the War on Christmas this year may be a bust. What's going on? Remember, the Religious Right powers itself with a kind of perpetual outrage machine. These groups rode the War on Christmas donkey

successfully for many years, sparking donations and getting its supporters in a lather, but all good things must end.

After all, there's so much more to be angry about.

I hear some football players are still taking a knee during the National Anthem!

So it appears that the Religious Right is moving on. There's always another target to attack, another "culture war" fight to pick and another claim of "persecution" to

assert.

Before he left Fox, O'Reilly declared victory in the War on Christmas. Again, it was mere bluster. The goal of O'Reilly and his theocratic pals was to force all of us to acknowledge Christmas as a religious holiday – and they failed miserably.

Our rights remain intact. If you want to go full-on Victorian Christmas with midnight mass, hymns and manger scenes, you have that right. If you want to celebrate a secular version that focuses on snowmen, Santa and sleigh bells you can. You can celebrate another holiday. Want to ignore them all? You can!

Despite the best efforts of O'Reilly, the American Family Association and other members of the "Christmas Police" who obnoxiously insist that you have to do things their way, we still have the right to decide for ourselves how, when and if to celebrate this month, as guided by conscience.

It's a great gift – and I call it a victory for our side.

Atheists' Holiday Billboards Say "Skip Church" to Avoid Fake News

Continuing its annual tradition of holiday season billboards, American Atheists has launched two campaigns. One urges Americans to skip church to avoid the original "fake news," and the other advertises their upcoming national convention in Oklahoma City.

On the first billboard, an illustration of a traditional manger scene accompanies the words "Just skip church. It's all fake news!" along with a holiday greeting from American Atheists. The second billboard shows the Oklahoma City skyline with Santa's sleigh flying overhead and says, "Just like Santa Claus, the Atheists are coming to town!" in a reference to the 2018 National Convention in Oklahoma City, March 30 to April I.

The billboards will be up for the month of December in Albuquerque, NM; Dallas-Ft. Worth, TX; and Oklahoma City and Tulsa, OK.

"Everyone knows that the stories we're told in church aren't the truth," said **David Silverman**,

president of American Atheists. "People ignore that fact because they enjoy the community, the friendship, and the traditions that go along with religion. But we're here to tell them that churches don't have a monopoly on any of that. There's a fantastic and vibrant community of atheists all across the country creating their own traditions and lifelong friendships."

"Spend time with your friends and family, give gifts, do charitable work, and enjoy the season. You can do all of that while also celebrating the truth," added Silverman.


The issue of "fake news" has been pervasive in American politics for more than a year. According to a December 2016 Pew Research Center survey, almost two thirds of Americans say that made-up news causes a great deal of confusion about the basic facts of current events.

"People are rightly skeptical about some of the news they see on Facebook, hear from their family, or are told by elected officials," said **Nick Fish**, national program director for American Atheists. "But too often, they don't extend that skepticism to their religious views and what their religious leaders are telling them."

"And right now, we could all use a little more skepticism about the things we're told, no matter the source," Fish added.



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
