Scott O. Lilienfeld is the Samuel Candler Dobbs Professor of Psychology at Emory University in Atlanta, Georgia. He received his A.B. at Cornell University in 1982 and his Ph.D. in

psychology (clinical) from the University of Minnesota in 1990. He is editor of the journal Clinical Psychological Science and recent past president of the Society for a Science of Clinical Psychology. Dr. Lilienfeld is a Committee for **Skeptical Inquiry** (CSI) Fellow and member of the CSI

Executive Council. He is also a consulting editor for and regular contributor to **Skeptical Inquirer** magazine.

His primary areas of research include personality disorders, individual differences in cognitive biases, psychological misconceptions, and the relevance of scientific thinking to psychology. Dr. Lilienfeld has authored, co-authored, and co-edited over a dozen books, including 50 Great Myths of Popular Psychology (John Wiley & Sons, 2010) and Facts and Fictions in Mental Health (John Wiley & Sons, 2017).

Dear [WRITER] and [TEACHER],

Thank you for sending an interesting letter to the Atlanta Freethought Society. Our President, Laura Ross, has asked me

to reply, since I have some experience talking to students (though they were all high school or college students) about this subject.

Because I have no professional experience in discussing these matters with a middle school student, even a bright guy, and because the letter you sent to us came from the school address, I decided I'd better send my reply to [TEACHER] who can then decide whether your teacher or your parents need to see my letter first.

I'm guessing that you don't realize it, but you made a mistake, one that schools at all levels frown on: the words you sent were not in fact your own, but instead were written by Marilyn Adamson and published online here: www.everystudent.com/features/isthere.html. If you turned your letter to us in as a paper at school, it would be considered plagiarism and would probably get you a really bad grade. It's sometimes just fine to use someone else's words, but if you're honest you have to give them credit.

The whole matter of debating whether any god(s) exist goes back at least 2500 years (Epicurus is said to have posed the argument against a god's existence usually called "The Problem of Evil" around 300 BCE).

If you're interested in another set of arguments in favor of God and Christianity, try looking up William Lane Craig online—he's probably the most famous defender of Christianity in Georgia, and he generally lists five reasons for believing.

If you'd like to see arguments on the other side, you can do an internet search for atheist responses to Adamson's "Six Straightforward Reasons." Or you can read an essay/talk in 1927 by the famous British mathematician and philosopher Bertrand Russell here: https://users.drew.edu/~jlenz/whynot.html

Or you can even read stuff I've written (though it was for high school or college students):

I have been asked as an atheist to talk with (or write to) you. As I'm sure you must realize, a reasonably thorough explanation regarding many issues would take far more than the time we will have together—weeks in fact—and would be likely to focus too much on some points and not enough on others. Therefore

I'm going to give you short answers to six basic questions, add a few other points, and then invite your questions. If you have a question that doesn't get answered by this, please e-mail me ebuckner@atheists.org. Thanks.

First, let me say that I am speaking for myself (and for an unknown number of others who call themselves atheists, agnostics, secular humanists, freethinkers, or rationalists)—but not for all such people. We certainly don't agree with each other on everything and opinions and beliefs among people like us vary greatly.

I. Origins: where did everything come from?

I think—but cannot prove—that the origins of the universe go back around 14 billion years to the Big Bang, that the start was a natural phenomenon, not a supernatural one, and that there was no "before" before that because time and space blossomed then. But on this subject at least, I'm relying on people who have studied and thought about this far more than I have. As to the origin and development of our own species, I accept as extraordinarily well supported a modern revised version of **Darwin's** theory of evolution, and see no reason to believe there was any "Intelligent Designer" behind it.

2. Identity: what does it mean to be a human being?

From Wikipedia (with which I agree, at least on this): "Humans, or human beings, are bipedal primates belonging to the mammalian species Homo sapiens (Latin: 'wise man' or 'knowing man') in the family Hominidae (the great apes). Compared to other living organisms on Earth, humans have a

American Atheists Submits Testimony Supporting the Equality Act

On April 3rd, American Atheists submitted testimony in support of the Equality Act for the hearing held by the U.S. House Judiciary Committee.

Currently, the U.S. has a patchwork of non-discrimination protections for LGBTQ people that vary from state to state, municipality to municipality. In many of these state and municipal laws, religious exemptions of varying breadth and

applicability create loopholes that permit discrimination.

"The Equality Act would create a foundation of basic non-discrimination protections across the nation, ensuring that LGBTQ people are protected in areas such as employment, housing, education, and public accommodations," wrote **Alison Gill**, Vice President for Legal and Policy.

"We're pleased that the authors of this bill have not included new religious exemptions for these crucial civil rights protections," said **Nick Fish**, President of American Atheists. "Religion isn't a license to discriminate and any bill that adds loopholes and exceptions doesn't actually protect equality."

The Equality Act would also protect youth in child welfare services by

preventing discrimination against LGBTQ people by state-funded religious foster care and adoption agencies. Currently, 10 states have laws on the books that allow discrimination on the basis of religion, and other states are considering this issue. A Tennessee bill that passed the State House yesterday could make Tennessee the 11th state to put religious beliefs of providers above the well-being of adoptive and foster children.

"Sadly, these laws prevent children from finding loving, permanent homes by allowing agencies to turn away qualified prospective parents," explained Gill.

"With 287 original co-sponsors, the Equality Act has overwhelming bipartisan support. And with a substantial majority of Americans supporting LGBTQ protections and opposing religious refusals, this commonsense legislation is long past due," she added.

highly developed brain capable of abstract reasoning, language, and introspection. This mental capability, combined with an erect body carriage that frees their upper limbs for manipulating objects, has allowed humans to make far greater use of tools than any other species. DNA evidence indicates that modern humans originated in Africa about 200,000 years ago, and they now inhabit every continent, with a total population of over 6.6 billion as of 2007."

3. Purpose/meaning: What is the point of it all?

There isn't one, other than what we—individually and together—choose.

4. Morality: How should we act?

The essence of morality is to treat others, especially other human beings, well. It's best to start with "do no harm" or "treat others as you want to be treated"—ideas that were developed long before Judaism or Christianity or other theisms. Moral codes said to come from "God" have been, historically, as variable and as inadequate as any without such claims.

5. Destiny: How will it all end?

In death and decomposition for each of us as individuals. For earth and for our species, eventually oblivion as well—but not any time soon, I hope.

6. Deity: Is there a supreme power? God? Many gods?

There are obviously natural forces—gravity, nuclear energy, astronomical forces, tsunamis, etc.—that are far stronger than any human and quite probably stronger than all of us together. But there is no credible evidence for any intelligent, thoughtful, or caring supernatural force or supreme being. I see no reason, therefore, to worship, "listen" to, or to beg from any god(s).

A few other points:

A. I don't think there is any evil supernatural force, either—so I'm not a Satanist.

B. I'm not "rebelling" against God or mad at Him/Her/It.

C. I'm familiar with many Christian (and other religious) ideas; I think they are often interesting, worth considering, etc.—but that most such ideas are fundamentally wrong.

D. I support a strict separation of church and state, for everyone's sake.

Whatever you believe, however strongly you disagree with or agree with me, I urge you to think carefully and to read widely, from books or people you agree with and from those you do not. At your request (or your teacher's or parents') I can send a list of some books I agree with (mostly) and recommend. Some of them include things I've written.

Poll Shows Nearly Half Of American Voters See 'Christian Nationalism' As A Threat

A new poll shows that nearly half of all voters in America believe that Christian nationalism is a threat to the nation. While I wish that number were higher, the poll indicates that a solid base of Americans perceive the dangers of the exclusionary "Christian nation" perspective peddled by the Religious Right. That's not a bad platform on which to build our educational efforts.

That's one drawback to Christian nationalism. Here's another: It robs us of the true story of our country's origins and replaces it with a simplistic, inaccurate myth.

This past weekend, I gave talks to groups in Somerset, N.J., and Willow Grove, Pa. I delivered the same speech in both places. It was titled "Separation of Church and State: Where We've Been, Where We Are and Where We'd Like to Be." During the section of the talk that covered "where we've been," I debunked the Religious Right's fallacious Christian nation myth and

explained that the real story of how we went from a collection of colonies, many of which had theocratic leanings, to a nation that enshrined religious freedom for all and protected it with a wall of separation between church and state, is much more interesting and inspiring.

What the Religious Right is offering is a form of what I call "historical creationism." Just as they don't like evolution so they fashioned a new, bogus "science," Religious Right activists don't like our nation's actual history, so they invented a fake one. Fortunately, it is easily debunked: The next time someone tells you that the United States was founded to be an officially Christian nation, ask them to show you where it says that in the Constitution. (Here's some more evi-



Good news!

Most Americans reject the claim that the United States is a "Christian nation."

The poll, conducted by the Morning Consult, found that among registered voters, 20 percent see Christian nationalism – the belief that the United States is or ought to be an officially "Christian nation" that extends preference to that faith – as a "critical threat." Twenty-seven percent see it as an important issue but not a critical threat. Thirty-five percent say it's not a threat at all, and 18 percent say they're not sure.


Not surprisingly, the results sharply diverge depending on one's political views. Forty-seven percent of Republicans say they don't consider Christian nationalism a threat at all, but only 24 percent of Democrats say that. Sixty-three percent of Democrats perceive Christian nationalism as a serious or important threat.

Commenting on these results, AU President and CEO Rachel Laser told the Morning Consult that Christian nationalism is a problem because it fosters "efforts to restrict the space for religious pluralism in the country and give special privileges to a narrow segment of white Christians in America."

Added Laser, "There is a strong movement to preserve white Christian power in America right now and a real feeling of fragility about the changing demographics of America."


