

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Note from **Ed Buckner**: I have quite a few friends who, like me, submit Letters to Editors—an opinion outlet that is quite valuable, in my never humble opinion—but getting one of these in the New York Times is quite rare. And when it is a spot-on great letter and from a friend I really admire and respect (**Pam Woodley**), that is truly something to celebrate. Her letter from 18 October is printed here in full with her permission):

Re **“Forms Suggest Kushner Paid Tax Bills of \$0”** (front page, Oct. 14), To the Editor:

You report that 37-year-old **Jared Kushner**, with a net worth of \$324 million, has likely paid no federal income taxes during five of the past eight years.

For many years, I have volunteered with the I.R.S.’s Volunteer Income Tax Assistance program, doing taxes for low-income people at no cost to them. I was touched by one young man about Mr. Kushner’s age who came into a VITA center in a crime-ridden Atlanta neighborhood. He was

filing his first tax return even though he was in his 30s. I wondered what he had done to support himself before his warehouse job. I had my suspicions.

His pre-tax income that year was \$20,000. He had had nothing withheld for taxes and owed \$2,000 in federal taxes and a substantial amount in state taxes. I

remember telling him that and seeing the despair and shock in his eyes. I remember fearing that his attempt to play by the rules had failed and that he would go back to doing whatever he was doing before.

There is something extremely rotten, not in Denmark, but here in the U.S.A., when the fantastically privileged pay nothing to support our country, and young men like that one are required to pay their fair share.

After losing in two federal courts, the **Trump** administration is back at the drawing board on a new strategy to undermine women’s access to basic healthcare.

It was announced at the end of October that administration officials are revising rules— blocked from taking effect last year by two federal judges — that allow employers to claim a “religious objection” to their obligation to provide employees insurance coverage for contraceptives as mandated by the Affordable Care Act. As recently as October 29, the Trump administration **mischaracterized this as “nuns ordered to pay for contraceptives.”**

Under the ACA, employers are generally required to provide insurance coverage for preventive care, including contraceptives. The Trump administration’s first attempts to expand exemptions from this mandate began in 2017, and were quickly blocked in two federal courts.

While the details of the forthcoming changes remain unclear, the Administration reportedly hopes they will **“overcome the judge’s objections without fundamentally altering the purpose or the effects of the rules.”**

FFRF fervently condemns the Trump administration’s continued use of religious dogma to subjugate women and the Justice Department’s callous, patriarchal claim that “a woman who loses coverage of her chosen contraceptive method through her employer may still have access to such coverage through a spouse’s plan. Or she may otherwise be able to pay out of pocket for contraceptive services.”

The contraceptive mandate has given more than 55 million women access to birth control without additional co-payments. Under these new regulations, hundreds of thousands could lose that coverage. The assumption that women can rely on a spouse’s plan for basic healthcare is an affront to individual liberties, and rolling back protections disproportionately impacts already disenfranchised women.

“As it has for millennia, religion is being used to oppress women,” notes FFRF Co-President **Annie Laurie Gaylor**. “Employers have no business sticking their noses into intimate health decisions by female workers. It’s outrageous.”

Whenever these changes are made public, we can expect them to be as unlawful as the original rules put in place by the administration a year ago. FFRF will continue to staunchly support a woman’s right to comprehensive and quality health care free from the imposition of her employer’s religious beliefs.

Theocracy Will Come To Washington State If This Legislator Has His Way

A state legislator in Washington is **under scrutiny** after issuing a document that outlines the “Biblical Basis for War.”

The manifesto distributed by state Rep. **Matt Shea** (R-Spokane Valley) conjures up images of a “Holy army” that will overturn marriage equality and legal abortion as well as ban “idolatry and occultism.” Openly proclaiming that “God is a Warrior,” the document chillingly lays down rules for dealing with those who refuse to obey “biblical law”: They should first be given a chance to surrender, but if they choose to resist, they should be invaded, conquered and, in some cases, killed.

“If they yield – must pay share of work or taxes,” the manifesto says. “If they do not yield – kill all males.”

Faced with the document’s troubling contents, Shea

decided to go with the always-popular claim that it was taken out of context. The document, he says, was part of a lecture series on the Old Testament.

There’s good reason to be skeptical. Shea has long championed **far-right causes** and hangs out with groups that advocate “Christian nation” ideas, promote conspiracy theories and even press for eastern Washington forming its own state. Many of these people would like to see a society built on “biblical law” – as they define it, of course.

All Religious Right groups are extreme, but at the furthest fringe there rests a collection of people who openly embrace theocracy. They go by different names – Christian Reconstructionists, theonomists, dominionists or Christian nationalists. Many of them argue for a society based on the legalistic books of the Bible, especially Leviticus. In their view, anyone who fails to follow all of the laws outlined in these books – even the complex dietary restrictions – should be imprisoned or killed.

In 1988, I **wrote an article about this movement** for Church & State and interviewed several of its leaders. It was highly disturbing to chat with people who would matter-of-factly explain to you that the Bible mandates the death penalty for homosexuality, blasphemy, “witchcraft,” adultery, “unchastity” and propagation of false doctrines, among other things.

The Reconstructionists are no fans of democracy. One of them, **Gary North**, who declined my request for an interview back in ‘88, has written that because the Bible does not recognize democracy, there can be no such thing as “one man, one vote.” North said the world has been “threatened” by such ideas.

He and other Reconstructionists also despise the very idea of freedom of conscience because, in their view, it can lead people down the wrong path. The founding father of Reconstructionism, a man named **Rousas John Rushdoony** who died in 2001, was clear on this, once writing, “In the name of toleration, the believer is asked to associate on a common level of total acceptance with the atheist, the pervert, the criminal, and the adherents of other religions as though no differences existed.”

It’s sometimes argued that people with thinking this far around the bend are just cranks who can be safely dismissed. That would be a mistake. While the Reconstructionists are not likely to seize control next week, their movement has had a profound influence on America’s Religious Right groups.

Calls for “biblical values” in public life or demands that a narrow slice of right-wing fundamentalist Christianity merge with the state contain more than an echo of Reconstructionist thought. Efforts to strip members of the LGBTQ community of their rights or control women’s reproductive lives are usually anchored in someone’s narrow interpretation of the Bible. Demands that our public schools stop teaching evolution or parrot bogus “Christian nation” history are rooted in the false belief that America would be better off if church and state were thoroughly mixed.

Many people active in the Religious Right long to use their religion to tell the rest of us what to do, although they deny that when pressed. The Reconstructionists are at least honest enough to say it upfront. Shea’s manifesto is more of the same. It’s an insistence that the Bible (as interpreted by a small band of far-right fundamentalists) provides justification for whatever these folks want to do – and that usually involves them running everyone else’s lives.

When you survey the incredible diversity of religious and non-religious thought in our free society, it’s hard to grasp that there are some people who think the founders made a mistake when they rejected church-state union and theocracy, opting instead for a wall of separation between church and state. Yet recent events have proven to us, once again, that religious and political extremism is alive and well in our nation.

Advocates of theocracy are among us. They have a right to their strange beliefs – and we have a right to tell them how wrong they are.

American Humanists Will Defend Church State Separation at the Supreme Court

On November 2nd, the Supreme Court announced that it will hear arguments from the American Humanist Association's (AHA) legal team regarding the unconstitutionality of the 40-foot-tall Christian cross towering over a busy Bladensburg, Maryland intersection. This will be the AHA Appignani Humanist Legal Center's first case before the Supreme Court.

"We remain confident in our legal position and look forward to presenting arguments to the Supreme Court," said **Monica Miller**, senior counsel for the American Humanist Association and lead counsel on this case. "The Fourth Circuit's decision correctly recognized that the government's prominent Christian cross memorial unconstitutionally favors Christian veterans to the exclusion of all others," Miller added.

The AHA filed its **complaint** in February 2014, challenging the constitutionality of a massive Christian cross owned, maintained, and funded by the Maryland National Capital Park and Planning Commission. Following the December 2016 **oral argument** presented by Miller, the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals **ruled** in the AHA's favor. The court held that the government's monolithic Christian cross unconstitutionally endorses Christianity and fosters excessive government entanglement with religion. The American Humanist Association successfully **defeated** the Commission's and American Legion's petitions for rehearing en banc in **March 2018**.

In June of 2018, both the American Legion and the government separately petitioned the United States Supreme Court to issue a writ

of certiorari, hear the case, and overturn the Fourth Circuit's ruling. The AHA filed oppositions to both petitions, citing over thirty federal cases finding crosses unconstitutional, and highlighting concurring opinions from both **Justice Kennedy** and **Justice Alito**. Justice Alito's concurrence in *Salazar v. Buono* recognized that a Christian cross war memorial excludes Jewish and non-Christian veterans. Justice Kennedy's concurrence in *County of Allegheny v. ACLU* noted that the Establishment Clause obviously prohibits the government from erecting a cross in a conspicuous government location, stating "such an obtrusive year-round religious display would place the government's weight behind an obvious effort to proselytize on behalf of a particular religion."

The AHA's briefs also pointed out that the government's massive cross is in dangerous disrepair. The government has already spent \$117,000 in public funds on the cross and has earmarked an additional \$100,000 for necessary repairs, which may be futile. In an email, a Commission official expressed relief at the prospect that the Christian cross monument may very well crumble on its own, writing that "repairs to the structure have not proven sustainable or helpful in the long term" and suggesting the Commission start from scratch. Additionally, recent government records refer to the cross as a "public eyesore" and a "safety hazard."

"Rather than continue to waste taxpayer dollars repairing an exclusively Christian symbol, the government should use that money to construct a new memorial atop the historic platform that will honor all war veterans," says **Roy Speckhardt**, executive director of the American Humanist Association. "The current Christian monolith fails to represent the pluralistic nature of religion among veterans, and among Americans."

"This latest attack on the trans community exposes the deep cruelty and bigotry of the religious extremists who have been installed by the Trump administration at every agency of the federal government. This proposal is nothing but transparent pandering to far-right religious groups who have spent the last decade attacking even basic civil rights protections for LGBTQ Americans."

"No one should have to worry about losing their job, losing their home, being denied service in a public place, or being harassed because of who they are. The trans community has fought too hard to achieve those basic protections and to advance the cause of inclusive civil rights laws to turn back now."

"No policy change by this administration can silence the voices of the millions of transgender Americans or stop the march of progress. American Atheists will continue to stand with our trans friends and loved ones as we fight back against these relentless attacks on their very existence."

"Science, medicine, morality, common decency, and the law are on all our side. We will do everything in our power to elevate the voices and experiences of all trans atheists, and indeed all trans people, in public discourse to ensure that this administration's galling attempts to define millions of Americans out of existence will not succeed."


